

Simply turn to God each step of the way on this uncertain path – because although this path may be uncertain our God never changes and certainly never leaves us. God walks this path with us, so walk closely.

Christ is Risen – He is Risen indeed. Hallelujah!

### A Message from Our Friend Rev Eric Heselwood

Hope you are all behaving yourselves out there, not having parties, without inviting me!!

An interesting point on this first Sunday after Easter. Those early disciples were in lockdown men and women nursing broken hopes and shattered dreams. In Jesus they had hoped for the completion of Gods kingdom, but this charismatic young Rabi was another in a long list of preachers and prophets who had let them down. Instead of the Kingdom, was the cross.



So they gathered to lick their wounds and shut themselves away in that bolted and barred upper room, afraid that what had happened to Jesus could as easily happen to them. But the bars couldn't keep Jesus out, and his first word was PEACE. He asked Mary at the Tomb, not to touch him, but here he asked his doubting friends to place their finger into the mark of the nails, thrust their fist into his side. Those friends believed, because Jesus revealed himself to them, as he does to us today.

Lockdown, I am sure has not been easy for many of you on your own, probably the same, even for those who have had the support of family members. I can boast the cleanest and neatest garden in the area!! I have read books, fumed at social media, telling the government how to get on with the job!! But within my prayers, I have asked Gods protection for my family, as well as many others, cried over the stories of bereavement, and as I have clapped for the NHS, I

have surrounded my clapping with my prayers for those on the front line. Probably, you have done the same.

# Some words for the week ahead from the book 'Encountering the Depths by Mother Mary Clare SLG

The most difficult and decisive part of prayer is acquiring the ability to listen.

Listening in now passive affair, a space when we happen not to be doing or speaking.

Inactivity and superficial silence do not necessarily mean that we are in a position to listen. Listening is a conscious, willed action, requiring alertness and vigilance, by which our whole attention is focussed and controlled. Listening is in this sense a difficult thing. And it is decisive because it is the beginning of our entry into a personal and unique relationship with God, in which we hear the call of our own special responsibilities for which God has intended us.

Listening is the aspect of silence in which we receive the commission of God.
